Viewpoint

As life with COVID-19 progresses, we now hold on for the possible second wave. Personally, I thought that by now the bubble with the rest of Canada would be burst and people and traffic would free flow inside our country. I would like to take a moment and acknowledge all of the hard work that you have put into your farming operations in order to adapt your practices to protect the health and safety of your workers, your families, your communities, and yourselves. This was something that none of us saw coming, and we are proud of how you all rose to the challenge.

In other news, there were notable improvements in rural internet announced recently with Develop Nova Scotia – the Crown Corporation responsible for developing and implementing the strategy for high speed in NS. Their commitment to roll out reliable high-speed access to 97% of Nova Scotia is something we've asked for and is in our policy. A very positive move, however, it makes me wonder how much awareness there is in urban Nova Scotia of the burden the lack of high-speed puts on rural NS when attempting to do business. For example, we have heard from farm families that did videos of their farm for Open Farm Day that they simply could not send the video in through their internet and ended up driving to town to do the upload. It's reminiscent of stories our parents told of having to drive to town to talk to the banker because the party phone line was not private.

Hopefully the strategy provides adequate download and upload speeds so rural Nova Scotia has good quality high-speed internet. We're going to need it since I expect a lot of our interactions will be virtual for the foreseeable future.

As we move into fall, meeting season is beginning to pick up again! The fall session of the provincial legislature hasn't been announced yet and as of this writing there hasn't been an agreement on how it will be conducted. Federally,

they have transitioned to partial in person and virtual so I would expect the province can do something similar. Up until the Premier announced his departure there was a lot of speculation surrounding when we could expect a provincial election. Since the Liberal leadership conference will elect a new leader and Premier in February that puts speculation at rest until at least the spring of 2021. Federal timing is a little harder to predict but we may be heading to the polls federally in 2021 as well or depending how the new session of parliament goes, as soon as this fall!

One of our signature events going into the fall months for the past 20 years has been Open Farm Day. This year, Open Farm Day was a virtual event and all of the videos can be found by going to the Meet Your Farmer Facebook page. Over the last year we have ramped-up our Public Trust efforts through Meet Your Farmer thanks to funding from the Canadian Agricultural Partnership. Public Trust continues to be an important part of the Federations advocacy and we will continue to support your efforts to connect with consumers and share how you produce their food and other products.

On a final note, we continue to hear about farm registrations that are tied up in the process of providing statements of farming income. We are certainly aware of the issues around privacy of

information and have been assured that the information will only be used for verification purposes. If you have paid your registration fee and have not received your farm registration, NSDA may be holding it while awaiting your farm income verification. We understand that this limits access to programs, fuel tax, etc. and this also means those farms are not on our current membership list. we will continue to do our best and keep our farmers informed. In the interim, if you have not received your Farm Registration card, we encourage you to reach out to the Farm Registrar's office at (902) 893-6377. While this hold-up is a frustration for you as farmers, it is also a frustration for us as it impacts our ability to connect with our farm members.

Policy Corner

Internet Initiative in Nova Scotia

As our members are well aware, internet and cellular services are almost non-existent throughout rural Nova Scotia. Develop Nova Scotia announced plans to reach high speed internet services to 97% of Nova Scotia by Summer of 2022. The announcement released on September 1st highlights the areas expected to be covered by the projects. 97% isn't the full 100% that NSFA has been lobbying for, however, we are pleased to see the gap is finally narrowing. NSFA will continue to monitor progress on internet services throughout Nova Scotia.

Many in rural Nova Scotia will say that they have access to internet, but the quality is poor.


According to Develop NS,

"all projects will meet or exceed minimum required speeds of 50 Mbps download/10 Mbps upload for wired connections, and 25 Mbps download/5Mbps upload for wireless connections, with a plan to reach 50 Mbps across the board."

Road Maintenance

As road maintenance continues to concern farms throughout Nova Scotia, NSFA is continuing dialogue with senior staff on roadway maintenance plans. Many of you will recall a survey in 2016 which provided members an opportunity to identify which sections of roads were troublesome and why. TIR has once again agreed to consider submissions from NSFA for the "Rural Infrastructure Maintenance" or RIM funds. The RIM funds are allocated each February and

are targeted towards road maintenance issues that aren't part of regular maintenance schedules or the "five-year plan".

Watch for the opportunity to provide your input in the coming weeks.

More on Transportation:

NSFA has become increasingly aware that members are experiencing challenges with use of the roads. There appears to be inconsistent enforcement throughout the province and changes to procedures that weren't issues in recent years. NSFA staff have a meeting scheduled with the Deputy and staff from TIR to review these immediate concerns. Topics notably on our radar include hauling more than one implement behind a tractor, permitting FM plates on busses transporting farm workers, spring weight restrictions and clarification on the exemption for hauling agricultural products.

Regarding International Driving Permits (IDP) for foreign workers on farm in Nova Scotia, NSFA opened a conversation with TIR in early July to find a solution for TFWs requiring IDP past the August 31st extension originally granted. After some back and forth conversation and information gathering, we were unfortunately told near August 31st that government was unable to do anything further in terms of an extension. TIR did connect us with CAA, though this solution would have been preferred to have come earlier rather than at the last minute. For those who employ SAWP or TFW workers who require International Driving Permits, please follow NSFA's weekly eNews to receive timely updates. At the time of printing, a process was in place for workers from Mexico to obtain and International Driving Permit.

Government Relations

A lot of changes have or are in the midst of taking place in the political world. Premier McNeil has announced his resignation meaning there will be a leadership race and the winner will become the Premier of Nova Scotia, Erin O'Toole was elected as the leader for the Conservative Party of Canada and municipal elections are coming up on October 17th. COVID-19 has forced government to adjust how they do business and has therefore made us adjust our approach to the ways we do government relations.

Presentations to Caucuses

In August and September, NSFA Executive and Staff met with the caucuses for each the PC and NDP parties. Presentations to caucuses provide great opportunity to promote solutions for the pressing issues our industry is facing. Our presentations to the caucuses focused

on the importance of processing, local procurement, plan for maintaining dyke systems in Nova Scotia, funding for protecting agricultural land and the importance of maintaining rural infrastructure. There was a lot of discussion and we look forward to future collaborative efforts.

New Standing Policies

It's policy season here at NSFA. Policy season is the time of year when draft versions of our standing policies are rolled out to our membership for review before being voted on at our AGM. It's also when we make plans on how we are going to make change over the next 12 months. To make change, barriers to success in agriculture in Nova Scotia are identified. What's even more important than knowing the barriers are the solutions. Some solutions are moderately easy while others take time and investment.

NSFA's Standing Policies focus on solutions. While the reasons for the

standing policies are the issues, we track our progress against the identified solutions. This gives us 1) a clear goal to work towards and 2) an "ask" when government wants to know what support is needed.

This year, NSFA has **four** Standing Policies. The following policies will be presented and voted on at the NSFA's virtual Annual Meeting on December 3rd.

Mental Health in Agriculture

We applied for, and are grateful to have received, funding through the Canadian Agriculture Partnership's (CAP) COVID-19 Agriculture Response Program. The funding will support the development of a Mental Health Action Plan for Nova Scotia Farmers, which will include specific resources tailored to address the unique challenges and stressors presented in our region. Initial work has begun on the development of the Action Plan, and more information will be shared with our community in the coming months.


We also understand that immediate supports need to be put in place for our farmers, their employees and their families. This is why we have organized and scheduled a number of webinar and workshop options to be offered through Farm Safety Nova Scotia at no cost in the coming months and into the new year.

We also want to remind everyone of the Maintaining Mental Fitness during COVID-19 section that has been added to the Farm Safe Nova Scotia website. This page was created to make sure that farmers had resources available to support both themselves and their families throughout the global pandemic. One of the resources available is the "Eight Domains of Well-Being" by Dr. Andrea Jones-Bitton.

If you, or anyone on your farm is experiencing a mental health emergency, please contact 911 to get help right away. Our Farm Family Support Centre is also available 24/7, managed through our Member Assistance Program by Morneau Shepell (MAP), where farmers and their families are able to access up to three hours of service at no cost.





Do you need more water on the farm?

The Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture recently announced enhanced funding for the Sustainable Agricultural Water Supply section in the Soil and Water Sustainability program. This helps fund wells and pond construction, spring development, cistern installation and hook-ups to municipal pipelines. The assistance has been increased from 25% to 60% to a maximum of \$10,000. The intake period for these projects (Sustainable Agricultural Water Supply section only) has been extended until Dec 1, 2020.

Well Construction

If you are interested in a new well for the farm and are debating between a drilled or dug well, there are advantages and disadvantages to each type of construction. Drilled wells can provide a more consistent supply of potable water, but are more expensive to construct and flow rates and mineral levels can be issues in many areas around the province. Dug wells are cheaper to construct, but can run dry during dry periods of the growing season when water is needed the most. Bacteria issues are also common with dug wells and a water treatment system (i.e. UV light) would be recommended.

It would be a good idea to contact a local well driller to discuss the potential of well development in your area as their previous experience will provide an indication as to the potential for a new well. A searchable list of currently certified well drillers and diggers is available on the Nova Scotia Environment (NSE) website at: http://www.novascotia.ca/nse/cms/Search.asp.



NSE also provides an online Well Logs Database: http://novascotia.ca/nse/groundwater/welldatabase.asp that can provide valuable information when deciding if a drilled well is a good choice for the farm. Existing wells within a community can be searched and provide information related to well depths and yields. By reviewing other wells in your area, some indication as to the consistency or variability of water supply that can be expected with a newly constructed well can be gained.

Pond Construction

When planning to construct a pond on your property, there are a few considerations to keep in mind. A Nova Scotia Environment (NSE) approval is only required for water storage that exceeds 25,000 m3 (for scale, 25,000 m3 is equivalent to a two-acre pond that is 10 ft deep) or if wetlands or watercourses will be impacted during construction. Run-off from prolonged rainfall or heavy storms can flood a pond quickly. An important consideration is a good-sized overflow or spillway. Spillway design is one aspect of pond construction where professional assistance may be beneficial, however overflows work best if kept simple. Culverts through the front of an embankment, or tubular risers extending from the water surface to a drain running through the base of a dam, may leak around the edges, get plugged, or be too small to handle floods

The alternative is to place a spillway at a low point in the embankment, so excess water flows over and down the side of the pond. A liner made of waterproof geotextile should be used to prevent erosion, with rip-rap, or armor rock, placed on the liner to break the force of the water. Whenever possible, overflows should spill onto the natural gradient where the soil is well-sodded, rather than onto an artificial embankment where the soil may be more prone to erosion. An emergency spillway, set slightly higher than the main one, should also be considered as a backup.

Farewell to Agri-Futures Nova Scotia

To say that the last few years have been full of change would be an understatement. This is something that the agriculture industry knows all too well. This is something that industry organizations can attest to-including Agri-Futures Nova Scotia (AFNS). This past year alone has brought significant changes to AFNS with the Executive Director taking on a new role with the NSFA to support Nova Scotia farmers connecting with consumers in our province. This left the organization at a cross roads, wondering what direction they should turn and what action should he taken

Agri-Futures has done a lot of work since its formation in 1997. It's most known for delivering programs on behalf of Agriculture and Agri-Food for 17 years. More than \$16 million was delivered through five different funding programs from 1997 to 2014. More than 200 Nova Scotia led projects were completed and hundreds more collective outcome projects with other provinces were funded. Supporting industry led research and innovation was always at the heart of the association. When funding delivery ended AFNS believed that the industry needed support to connect the food system and increase collaboration. Launching recent initiatives that focus on Collective Impact, such as Grow Nova Scotia and overseeing the Salad Bar Pilot Project - working to increase local food procurement in NS schools.

The AFNS board held a special meeting last month to discuss next steps for the organization. Ultimately, with decreased capacity and resources, a special resolution was put forward to dissolve the organization. This decision was made after months of careful consideration.



We would like to acknowledge and commend the work that Agri-Futures has done over the past number of years as they worked to increase the amount of local food in our schools across the province.

Next Steps

The remaining AFNS funds will be distributed to the Nova Scotia Federation of Agriculture (NSFA). Following this, the NSFA will establish the "Grow Nova Scotia Food Committee" which will approve the disbursement of the Grow Nova Scotia food system funds held in internally restricted funds for projects that align with the establishment of a whole food system approach to increase access to local and healthy foods in schools.

"Agri-Futures has been a driving force behind local food initiatives our schools. The passion and dedication of current and previous board members and staff is noteworthy, they have shared the same drive to increase Nova Scotians local food consumption. I would like to thank everyone for the support they have provided our organization over the years and I look forward to the work of the Grow Nova Scotia Food Committee." – Richard Melvin, AFNS Board Chair. "At the NSFA our vision is a prosperous and sustainable future for Nova Scotia farms and farmers. One of the many ways we can work towards this vision is to continue AFNS's local food initiatives. Over the past number of months we have seen a significant shift in the buy local/support local movement, with Nova Scotians developing a great appreciation for Nova Scotian grown products. We are happy to accept the funds from AFNS and we are committed to continuing to build on the strong foundation Agri-Futures has built."

Progressive Agriculture Safety Days

Progressive Agriculture Safety Days is virtual this year. It is being held on October 23, 2020 from 10 am to 12 pm. NSYF Annual Meeting & Farm Transition Panel

Wednesday, December 2 @ 7:30pm

It is expected that in the next ten years \$50 billion in Canadian farm assets are to be transferred to the next generation or out of the industry. A 2019 survey indicated that only 16% of the farms have a written plan outlining how their transition will take place. With the transition of a farm operation being a journey that often takes years and a team of advisors to complete, this planning exercise is often delayed because there are too many jobs that need to be done today, this week or this season. The result is the senior generation feels overwhelmed and the junior generation confused with both wondering "Where do I start?" and "Who can I trust?".

Farm Credit Canada has recognized these challenges and in 2018 formed an Advisory Services team to work with farming families to do pre-transition planning. It is free service to help identify the family's transition goals. They will perform gap analysis in identifying where things are today and how you will get to where you need to be in the future. The farm is given some guidance and direction on what steps to take. Then there is a clear hand-off to the appropriate professionals where you can clearly discuss the plan to get you to the finish line.

A big key to successful family transfers is using strong, open communication.

Multi-generational farm families that have successfully transitioned did so by implementing a written plan, making decisions based on values and vision, and considering the impacts from an ideal financial, tax and legal perspective. A transition plan will examine options and identify obstacles, dealing with the management succession and the transition of assets

To start conversations and help farmers learn from others' experience, we will be hosting a virtual panel discussion. FCC Agriculture Transition Specialist Terry Jones will moderating the panel of two farms who will share their stories with you, followed by a question and answer session.

An Update on the AgriRecovery Request for Hurricane Dorian

Earlier this year, the Nova Scotia Department of Agriculture issued a Hurricane Dorian survey to gauge the impact Dorian caused on farms in the province. This survey was conducted as the preliminary assessment to determine whether Dorian met the eligibility criteria for an AgriRecovery request to the Federal government.

We have been informed by the NSDA that the information obtained through this survey did not provide enough to validate a request for AgriRecovery.
