

Where to Find Your Land's Parcel ID (PID)

- A PID is a unique 8-digit Parcel Identification Number that exists for every parcel of land in Nova Scotia.
- You may need to access your PID numbers for a particular piece of property for various reasons. Examples may include requiring a PID when processing certain funding applications or for taxation documentation.
- You can access your PID a number of different ways. These include:

Provincial Landscape Viewer

The Provincial Landscape Viewer is a mapping tool developed by the Nova Scotia Department of Natural Resources (DNR).



Once on the website, click the icon above and unselect “Forestry” and select “Property”. Zoom into your property using the + / - keys or your mouse wheel. When you zoom in close enough, the property boundaries will appear with the properties PID listed. With the icon below, you can select a different base map (e.g., roads or satellite imagery).

Property Online

Property Online offers information collected through the province's Land Registration Offices and other sources. Property Online requires you to subscribe and pay a user fee.

If you do not have access to the internet, you can call your local municipal office to access your PID. Municipal tax bills and Property Valuation Services assessments do not show PID numbers.

Parcel vs. Premise

People are sometimes confused between Parcel ID (PID for properties) and Premise ID (PID for livestock tracking). Premise IDs are issued by the NS Department of Agriculture and are specific to livestock tracking and are unrelated to Parcel IDs.
